Since the last proactive neighborhood review was conducted in March, we have been pleased to note significant improvements in the overall appearance of Highlands property—a benefit to all homeowners! A reminder that if you notice a home which is chronically in noncompliance and you would like to notify the HOA, please use the Enforcement Request Form which is available on the website.

► Common Non-Compliance

Issues

Part of what the HOA strives to achieve is an awareness of policies so homeowners aren't caught off guard. Please take time to review Rules and Regulations on our website: www.millcreekhighlands.org.

These are the most common noncompliance violations:

- Vegetation is growing in the cracks and seams of pavement—sidewalks, curbs, driveways.
- ➤ Weeds & grass have invaded planting beds.
- ➤ The edge of lawns is not trimmed along pavement and planting beds.
- > Trash bin are stored in view of the street.

► Neighborhood Safety

During the summer, an increase in acts of vandalism, theft, and other annoyances occur, particularly at night. According to Nathan Lerma, Police Support Officer for Mill Creek, there has been a noticeable increase in 'car prowls' in the area – so please remember: lock your car, keep valuables out of view including a GPS mount, and report suspicious activity to 911.

► Screening

As our neighborhood ages, many wall hedges and mass plantings have grown well over the 3 foot limit stipulated in our CC&Rs (Article VI, Section 12). Tall hedges can become a safety issue when visibility is obstructed for cars and pedestrians, especially children.
